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

Became known as the first "professional nurse"

1859 Founded a medical college for nurses

Decided to go to school to obtain my CNA and became an aide at a pediatric medical daycare.


1998 Obtained my LPN from Salem Community College in NJ

- 2006 Lead a workgroup to develop an education manual for parents of children that had to become TV dependent, and this manual won an award for Interdisciplinary relationships and is now used all over the hospital to educate parents.
- 2009 became the Nurse Mgr. for that unit
- 2011 back to bedside nursing in the PACU
- 2012 obtained my BSN at WilmU
- 2013 worked in the ER PT as Forensic nurse examiner
- 2021 left the hospital after 21 yrs to become a clinical educator at a Pediatric home care company
- 2023 Obtained my MSN with an Education track at WilmU

After 21 years in a level one trauma center, I saw the worst of the worst when it comes to children. There were some days that were hard, but the good days ALWAYS outweighed the bad days.

To be able to see a child come in through the ER maybe after a car accident and not be able to walk due to a brain injury and a few weeks, maybe months later that child walks out of the hospital makes it all worth it as a nurse.

According to the State of the World's Nursing (SOWN) report, there was a global deficit of almost 6 million nurses before the pandemic, and for the next 10 years, one in six nurses in the world is expected to retire. This means that 4.7 million new nurses will have to replace them (Machitidze, 2022).


