

Certified Registered Nurse Anesthetist (CRNA)

- Who we are
 - We have been around for the past 150 years and the first to provide anesthesia on the battlefield of the American Civil War
 - 65K CRNA practicing Nationally.
 - Approximately 2500 new CRNA's graduate each year.
 - We work in all anesthesia care settings including as front-line providers for the US military
 - Legislation passed by Congress in 1986 made nurse anesthetists the first nursing specialty to be accorded direct reimbursement rights under the Medicare program



CRNA education requirements

- CRNA preparation requires at least 8–8.5 years of education and experience. You will need:
 - A baccalaureate or graduate degree in nursing or another appropriate major
 - An unencumbered license as a registered professional nurse and/or APRN in the United States or its territories
 - At minimum of one year of full-time work experience (or its part-time equivalent) as a registered nurse in a critical care setting
 - Graduation with a minimum of a doctoral degree from one of 141 accredited nurse anesthesia educational programs in the country
 - Nurse anesthesia programs range from 36–51 months and have an average of 9,432 hours of clinical experience.

What is Primary Care? What does a Pediatric Primary Care NP do?

- > Generalist: Birth to age 21 years
- > First contact point, provides comprehensive, continuous, person-centered care
- > Health promotion, disease or disability prevention, health education
- > Interface between the child/family and the health system; "organizer"
- Primary versus acute care NPs: degree of acuity (illness)
 - Well Visits
 - Sick Visits
 - Vaccines
 - Tests/Labs

- Refer to Specialists and Follow up
- Health Education
- Prescribe and Manage Medication
- Chronic Disease Management



School-Based Health Centers (SBHCs)

- School-based health centers provide healthcare where kids spend most of their time: in school
- SBHCs have been around in the US for over 25 years, mostly in high schools, and serve over 6 million children in the US, the District of Columbia, and Puerto Rico. SBHCs have been branching out to elementary and middle schools in the past decade.
- SBHCs often serve children that lack access to healthcare, have no health insurance, or have other health and socioeconomic inequalities.
- SBHCs can offer care such as primary care, mental health, dental care, and vision care.
- SBHCs are often a partnership between the school, community, and a health network like Nemours.










Nemours SBHCs

- Nemours has 17 SBHCs throughout Delaware.
- Seaford, Colonial, and Christina School Districts
- Seaford: 4 elementary
- Colonial: 8 elementary, 1 middle
- <u>Christina</u>: 2 early childhood, 2 intermediate (grades 1-8)
- Staffed by MAs, PNPs, and BHTs
- Physical and mental health services
- Care Coordination, mental health screening, address social needs, provide therapy/counseling
- 2 Chill Rooms in Christina School District













My Story

- Toured my first NICU in high school medical careers club and fell in love
- BSN from Villanova University
- NICU RN for 7 years at CHOP and Thomas Jefferson University Hospital
- MSN from University of Pennsylvania
- Neonatal Nurse Practitioner (NNP) at Jefferson, Crozer Chester Medical Center, and now Nemours Children's Health- Delaware since 2017



What is a Neonatal Nurse Practitioner (NNP)?

- RN who has worked several years in a Level III NICU
- Earned Master's degree in accredited neonatal nurse practitioner program
 - Studies diseases affecting newborns and high-risk mothers
 - Trains on advanced procedures to diagnose and treat sick newborns
 - Trains on emergency management of sick newborns at delivery
 - Some NNPs have a doctorate degree, this differs from a physician
- Passed national certification exam
- Works with interprofessional team, neonatologists and NNPs to attend emergency deliveries
- Can perform certain procedures, place orders, and prescribe medications




What is a Typical Day?

How to Become a Physician Assistant

- Earn an undergraduate degree. No specific major is mandated, but science or healthcare related majors will give you exposure to important concepts and learning
- 2) Patient Care Hours or Relevant Experience. Per <u>indeed</u> "A prerequisite of most PA programs is to have a minimum of 2,000 logged hours or three years of health care experience"
- 3) Complete a Physician Assistant Master's Degree program.
- 4) Pass the National Certifying Exam.

 CNA's, EMTs, medical assistants, phlebotomists are common examples



How did I get here?

<u>Undergraduate degree</u>: Liberal Arts College. 4 years. Bachelor of Arts. Biology Major.

Master's degree: Master of Science, Physician Assistant Studies. 26-month program.

<u>Patient Contact Hours</u>- camp counselor for handicapped children, lots lots of volunteering.

Current Job in the Emergency Department

- Care for kids of all ages!
- Spectrum of illness severity
- critically ill → moderately ill → rather well
- Variety of complaints:
- Injuries
 - Burns, broken bones, sprains/strains
- Medical conditions
 - Asthma, infections, dehydration, rashes, allergic reactions, psychosis, chronic diseases with complications
- Surgical and Traumatic Conditions
 - Appendicitis, intracranial injury, rupture or lacerated internal organs
- Unpredictable things too
 - Foreign bodies in the ear or nose (beads, toys, rocks, you name it!), ingestions of substances or objects
